SYNOPSIS

The FY16 budget includes \$37,000 in the General Fund for this membership.

BACKGROUND

The proposed motion would renew the Village's membership with the DuPage Mayors and Managers Conference for FY16-17 at a cost of \$36,776.40. The Village of Downers Grove has been a long-term member of the DMMC, a council comprised of municipal governments located within DuPage County, Illinois. The Conference is a not-for-profit organization support by membership dues and grants, dedicated to addressing municipal public policy issues.

Exhibit 2 – Additional Annual Benefits

Activity / Service Provided

Legislative

- Led a coalition of municipal groups to coordinate efforts and share resources in the legislative fight to protect local revenue. This included producing the Protect My Town website and developing and sharing talking points regarding local revenues being withheld by the state and the potential impacts of a property tax freeze. Collaboratively secured release of withheld funds including Use Tax, Motor Fuel Tax, video gaming, casino, and Wireless 9-1-1 Surcharge revenues.
- Generated talking points, briefing papers, fact sheets, weekly position sheets, and action alerts to assist members and enhance outreach to legislators on topics including the potential impacts of a property tax freeze, protection of the Local Government Distributive Fund, threats to state-collected local revenues, Workers' Compensation Act reform, pension reform, and unfunded mandates.

- Documented high priority unfunded mandates and statutory restrictions that unfairly burden municipalities and require reform; encouraged consideration by the Local Government Consolidation and Unfunded Mandates Task Force for inclusion in its report with specific policy and legislative recommendations.
- Provided municipal leaders with opportunities to connect with legislators and participate in the legislative process through a large-group Springfield Drive Down.
- Coordinated development of the *2016 Legislative Action Program (LAP)* to guide DMMC members' legislative efforts and reflect members' priorities.
- Provided municipal leaders with the opportunity to network and share DMMC's legislative priorities with legislators through successful Legislative Reception and Dinner.
- Provided municipal leaders with opportunities to network and build relationships through Coffee Breaks with legislators.
- Maintained a leadership role in the Pension Fairness for Illinois Communities Coalition to advance the platform for public safety pension reform.
- Collaboratively extended sunset date for wireless 9-1-1 funding.

Regulatory

- Successfully led negotiations with Nicor to develop a model franchise ordinance which was approved by the Northern Illinois Municipal Natural Gas Franchise Consortium (Consortium) Steering Committee. The 21 member municipalities who participated in the Consortium received a total first year benefit of nearly \$700,000 and anticipate significant future savings as well. (See Exhibit 4 for a list of fiscal benefits by municipality.)
- Collaborated with the International Code Council to address member concerns regarding restrictive plumbing standards instituted by the Illinois Department of Public Health, resulting in positive changes to the Department's enforcement of these standards.

Transportation/Planning

- Let 25 Surface Transportation Program (STP) projects (\$21.9 million in federal funds), doubling the number of projects let over the previous year while maintaining a model STP recognized for innovative practices. Adopted new methodology provisions to improve on-time performance of STP projects.
- Coordinated an annual STP workshop and call for projects where members were trained, informed, and assisted in maximizing federal STP funds. Continued to provide project assistance for all STP projects from kick-off to letting.
- Proactively worked to mitigate the threat of federal STP fund rescissions by changing the DMMC STP methodology to incentivize bringing projects to construction letting in FY 16 and FY 17 with a 5% increase in federal match.
- Conducted survey and distributed results providing member municipalities' public works departments with opportunities for loaning or renting equipment from other municipalities' departments.
- Worked with the City of Elmhurst to compile data and provide the Federal Railroad Administrator (FRA) updated information for the eighteen at-grade rail crossings in DuPage County that comprise the CN Quiet Zone. Confirmed that all agreed upon safety measures have been implemented within the quiet zone and that crossings conform to FRA requirements.

Information/Publications

- Developed the white paper *Road Salt Procurement in IL – Strategies and Recommendations* with valuable best practices gathered from a panel discussion with Cargill Deicing Technology and DuPage County. The white paper was shared with DMMC members, regional COGs, DuPage townships, and counties.

- Developed white papers on promoting active transportation in DuPage County, the 2015 IDOT Fall Planning Conference, and the Complete Streets Conference.
- Coordinated with public relations consultant and DMMC President Smolinski to develop an op-ed addressing threats to LGDF that was published in Crain's Chicago Business.
- Authored *In Depths* that explored contemporary tools and approaches for parking management and best practices for siting bicycle facilities.
- Updated members with information on timely and relevant budgetary trends, data, and analysis through the *Annual Revenue Survey*. Revised survey based on member feedback.
- Continued to assist members in educating citizens on current issues by distributing Municipal Drop-Ins, an informational tool with succinct summaries for newsletters and e-blasts. Featured were the state's withholding of local revenues, including Use Tax, Motor Fuel Tax, video gaming, casino, and Wireless 9-1-1 Surcharge revenues; a description of the legislative priorities in the *2016 LAP*; PSEBA reform, the DuPage County Budget Survey; Forest Preserve signage; and contemporary tools and approaches for parking pricing and management.
- Developed *In Brief* articles, including: "FRA Launches Website for Municipalities to request Bridge Inspection Reports," "Federal Act Adopts New Standards for Crude Oil Transport," "Integrated Ventra App Now Available," "NACTO's Innovative Guidelines for Street, Bikeway (and Transit) Design," "Exploring Alternatives to the Motor Fuel Tax (MFT)," "IDOT Hosting Multi-Year Program (MYP) Outreach Meetings," "CMAP Releases New Local Ordinances Toolkits," "Model City Complete Streets Legislation Recognized," and "Impact DuPage Community Health Website."

Membership

- Facilitated outreach to the Village of Lemont to rejoin DMMC, expanding the municipal voice of DMMC.
- Implemented a temporary dues decrease for membership in 2015-2016 for a total benefit of \$322,880. (See Exhibit 4 for a list of fiscal benefits by municipality.)
- Continue to coordinate with Suburban Purchasing Cooperative, allowing members to reduce costs on vehicles and equipment as well as save staff time.
- Approved a DMMC Bylaws amendment to increase the maximum number of at-large Board members from three to five, to retain valuable institutional knowledge among Board membership.

Grant Assistance

- Identified and communicated to members more than 15 grant and funding opportunities. (See Exhibit 5 for a list of grants received by municipality.)

Stormwater

- Coordinated member feedback regarding the FEMA stormwater mapping process which led to FEMA revising their maps to account for municipal concerns.

Training/Networking

- Coordinated a very successful Municipal Innovation Celebration highlighting 16 innovative and creative ways members are improving their municipalities, solving problems, and bringing value to communities and residents.
- Facilitated peer-to-peer orientation and networking sessions by initiating several very successful and well-attended Mayors Only Coffees.
- Continued to coordinate annual Corporate Partner Appreciation Coffee to strengthen relationships between members and the businesses that participate in DMMC's Corporate Partner Program, an important revenue source which offsets member dues.

- Successfully recruited several additional firms to increase participation in Corporate Partner Program.
- Maintained a consistent line of communication with County officials by facilitating meetings between mayors and County Board Chairman Cronin, convening three well-attended and productive meetings of the Joint County-Conference Intergovernmental Committee, and facilitating regular meetings between senior County and DMMC staff.
- Facilitated networking opportunity between members and representatives of the Southwestern Illinois Council of Mayors during the 2015 large-group Springfield Drive Down.
- Coordinated valuable and informative presentations by Congressman Peter Roskam and Bill Foster, Senators Tom Cullerton and Michael Connelly, and Executive Directors Dave Bennett (Metropolitan Mayors Caucus), Mark Fowler (Northwest Municipal Conference), and Ed Paesel (South Suburban Mayors and Managers) at DMMC meetings.
- Coordinated a workshop for mayors and other elected officials featuring networking, a legislative update, and media strategies.
- Coordinated and facilitated a panel discussion on rock salt procurement with Northwest Municipal Conference, West Central Municipal Conference, Southwest Conference of Mayors, Will County Governmental League, DuPage County, and Cargill Deicing Technology.
- Actively participated in numerous District meetings, providing important updates on DMMC matters.

- Led a collaboration and shared costs with regional municipal groups to produce the Protect My Town website and protect Local Government Distributive Fund revenue.
- Led a collaboration of regional municipal groups to develop talking points regarding local revenues being withheld by the state and the potential impacts of a property tax freeze.
- Increased use of in-house printing for *LAP* rather than third party printing services, saving DMMC approximately 80%
- Continued to share attorney's costs for the Consortium with 38 participating municipalities.
- Leased surplus office space to IPBC for \$4,000 per year and IMET for \$6,000 per year.
- Utilized cost cutting measures as well as frugal supply management to significantly decrease supply expenses.
